





Who doesn't love this time of the year. It's the time we can jet off to sunshine. I have to admit to needing a holiday recently, and to be sure of sunshine, I jetted off to a tropical Island.

I leaned in to admire a large tree and lo and behold found two enormous black eyes staring at me.



Why Lord Byron?

Lord Byron Branch was established in 1839, that's 186 birthdays.

Next month, you can read about how Lodges obtained their names. For today, however, we'll look briefly at Lord Byron Lodge (now Branch).

Lord Byron lived from 1788 to 1824. He was a major figure in the Romantic movement. A celebrity for his time, he was admired for his poetry, personal life and charisma that he created. As a peer, he was also a supporter of radical reform, supporting the Luddites and Italian and Greek independence. No wonder that this liberal and popular figure was in such high esteem to have a Lodge named after him.

How would Lord Byron have enjoyed today's Oddfellows? Well, he could attend the great new and regular events in Lee and Forest Hill set up by Karen Lewis for the rest of the year. Members meet twice

a month at Colfe's sports ground, Eltham Road in Lee for a business meeting and a presentation or games evening. Members also meet socially every Thursday afternoon at

Oddfellows Memorabilia

Paul Fitton continues his look at past Oddfellows items

This Oddfellows commemorative pearlware mug has green, red and black transferware. It was made probably in Staffordshire and could be a quite early piece, perhaps between 1820 and 1840. It weighs 276gms and is 10.5cms or 4½" high and 9.5cms or 3¾" in diameter.

This first picture portrays Lady Justice balancing the scales. This dates back to the goddess Maat in ancient Egypt. She is holding a set of scales to measure the weight of evidence for and against. Since the 16th century, Lady Justice has been depicted wearing a blindfold. This represents impartiality.

The inscriptions read 'Independent Order of Odd Fellows' and the Latin Oddfellows motto 'Amicitia Amor et Veritas', meaning 'Friendship, Love and Truth' at the front. It bears a shield at the front containing Oddfellows symbols. The interior of the rim is also decorated with a beautiful floral border.

The figure of a woman worker values the female labourer at that time. Women had second-class status in industry. She was generally confined to less skilled and lower-paid work than men for performing the same work. This picture recognised the changing role of women at that time from domestic to economic.

my favourite shop which stood beside the grass some years ago. There did I spend my weekly two-and-six on drinks and sweets for picnics on the green.


It's now a concrete mass, abhorred by all who loved that simple life, seventy years past.



Clapham Wham Bam!

Our historic, 173 year old hall at Clapham is just waiting to be explored. The building is rich in history. It was built originally as a Baptists hall as the Ebenezer Chapel, with the adjoining building, (the manse), known as the Ebenezer Cottage, in 1853. However, just a few years after, the Baptists moved elsewhere and the chapel was purchased by the Wesleyan Bible Christians.

Ebenezer Hall remained in the Wesleyians' possession until 1908, when Oddfellows' Pride of Clapham Lodge bought the two buildings and continues to hold activities there regularly. Part of the building is rented to the London Shambhala as their meditation centre.

Eleven members were initiated on 5 June, including one from Lord Byron Branch. This strengthens base, making a core of potential new officers for Clapham's management team.

Locally. Members visited the National Trust property at 575 Wandsworth Road in May and are looking forward to a guided tour of several of Clapham's Blue Plaques on 27 August.

Clapham Branch's Secretary and Social and Development Officer is Jane Parkin. She opens the door at 2.30pm every Tuesday to welcome everyone for a Knit and Natter, which is something like a Sit and Chatter. As the name implies, you can knit and sew, etc and learn new



crafting skills. The afternoon flows into late afternoon exercise classes and an early evening Yoga group. Members pay just £5 a month for the weekly Yoga sessions. Members also meet at 8pm every Thursday for a games evening. In addition, Thursday afternoons alternate between a visit to Clapham Picturehouse for only £4 and a two-course meal and tea/coffee for only £5 for members (£7 for non-members). The menu is varied. Our summer meals started with a Ploughman's Lunch.

The fortnightly cinema visits are at Picturehouse, just five minutes' walk from Oddfellows hall. The cinema has modern seating and bar showing mainstream new, classic and cult films. Members can return to Oddfellows Hall after the viewing if they wish, the evening continuing with a social drink at our bar, or tea and coffee if preferred, as well as a fun evening.

Members can chat, play games or cards, do puzzles, read, play darts or pool – and just relax! Jane updates everyone weekly via WhatsApp.

On the third Thursday every month, a business meeting is held to facilitate Branch work with Branch Secretary Jane Parkin guiding officials.

"My PhD – made possible by the generous support of the Oddfellows – has made some significant contributions to cancer research," said Nur. "My ultimate goal is to find ways to prevent or overcome drug resistance, and my model will let us run

the pre-clinical studies needed to move promising strategies toward the clinic."

Tim added: "Until recently, we did not understand enough about how our immune system recognises and responds to tumours, or about how tumours learn to switch off our immune responses



to deploy cancer vaccines effectively. This is changing rapidly, and cancer vaccines hold great promise for kinder, more effective therapy, though significant challenges remain."
