Following our walk in April to the site, we are returning on an annual open day to see the archaeological excavations and Tudor foundations at Scadbury Moated Manor. We can follow a self-guided trail



around the moated manor site with experts to answer questions. We will see the archaeological excavations and the foundations of the Tudor kitchens and great hall, showing how these would have been used when the house was owned by the Walsingham family.



# **Memory Lane - Crockenhill**

Bob points out that Crockenhill is still in Kent. 'Yes, Greater London is only a few yards down the road but we don't get free train travel because we are still in the county of Kent with a Bromley post code.'

Bob adds that, 'the building behind the bus was a pub called the Anchor in Hope,'... an ale house only. It was knocked down as we arrived over 50 years ago. We used to have three pubs, The Anchor, The Chequers and the Fruiterers Arms, known locally as the Mud 'ole. It was in a dip in the unmade road at the time, When it rained muddy water would drift into the pub on their wood and sawdust floors and farm labourers

coming off the farms with their muddy boots didn't help. It was an ale house only until about 50 years ago when spirits was introduced and you could get a good meal down there. It was pulled down about ten years ago and a row of houses was built in its place but the pub sign still stand proudly just outside. The only pub we now have though shut through this pandemic is The Chequers. One could buy a decent pint or spirits and two course meal for £9. I really don't know how they are going to survive.'

The Fruiterer's Arms was originally named The Victoria when it opened in 1860 and retained that name until 1886. Bob's painting shows the pub, which was at the end of Crockenhill village in 1993. The pub closed in 2012.

### **Oddfellows Memorabilia**

Paul Fitton continues his look at past Oddfellows items

This Oddfellows commemorative pearlware mug has green, red and black transferware. It was made probably in Staffordshire and could be a quite early piece, perhaps between 1820 and 1840. It weighs 276gms and is 10.5cms or 4½" high and 9.5cms or 3¾" in diameter.

This first picture portrays Lady Justice balancing the scales. This dates back to the goddess Maat in ancient Egypt. She is holding a set of scales to measure the weight of evidence for and against. Since the 16th century, Lady Justice has been depicted wearing a blindfold. This represents impartiality.

The inscriptions read 'Independent Order of Odd Fellows' and the Latin Oddfellows motto 'Amicitia Amor et Veritas', meaning 'Friendship, Love and Truth' at the front. It bears a shield at the front containing Oddfellows symbols. The interior of the rim is also decorated with a beautiful floral border.

The figure of a woman worker values the female labourer at that time. Women had second-class status in industry. She was generally confined to less skilled and lower-paid work than men for performing the same work.

This picture recognised the changing role of women at that time from domestic to economic.



### Scarborough hosts the nation's Oddies



For the 20th time in more than 200 years the Society's Annual Movable Conference (AMC) was held in beautiful Scarborough, hosted by Vale of York Oddfellows.

Members representing their Branches converged on the seaside town from

all corners of the country to assess the previous 12 months and to decide on the direction of the next.

There was change at the top, as South London Oddfellows' John Mann replaced Vale of York Oddfellows' Barbara Needham as Grand Master.

As well as business, attendees enjoyed a range of social activities, including indulging in the delights of an Oddfellows Brass performance, the annual Roy Harmer Memorial Bowls Tournament, and a day trip to Whitby and Scarborough Fair.

# Final update from HA Andrews Memorial Fund recipients

Nur Zainal, who's PhD at the University of Southampton has been supported by the HA Andrews Memorial Fund, and Professor of Cancer Biology Tim Fenton (pictured), addressed the Society's annual conference as three years of funding comes to an end.

"My PhD – made possible by the generous support of the Oddfellows – has made some significant contributions to cancer research," said Nur. "My ultimate goal is to find ways to prevent or overcome drug resistance, and my model will let us run

the pre-clinical studies needed to move promising strategies toward the clinic."

Tim added: "Until recently, we did not understand enough about how our immune system recognises and responds to tumours, or about how tumours learn to switch off our immune responses



to deploy cancer vaccines effectively. This is changing rapidly, and cancer vaccines hold great promise for kinder, more effective therapy, though significant challenges remain."
