



Activity Suspended at Sheringham Lifeboat Station

A new Lifeboat is scheduled to be launched in the third quarter of 2025 at Sheringham bearing the name of the Oddfellows. However, the Lifeboat Station has been closed due to safety concerns in respect of the structure of the Lifeboat Station and the movement of the land behind. All activity, including lifesaving operations, at Sheringham RNLI was suspended on 11 February 2025. Search and rescue cover is being provided by Wells RNLI and Cromer RNLI, Sheringham's flanking stations. We shall keep members advised.

The Oddfellows donated a Lifeboat to the RNLI for the first time in 1961, The Manchester Unity of Oddfellows. The Oakley Class type vessel was presented/named by Oddfellows Chairman (Grand Master) JG Barnes and named by HRH Princess Marina, Duchess of Kent. The boat served for 29 years, launching 127 times and saving 134 lives. It has been RNLI Sheringham's longest serving lifeboat and is now in permanent display at The Sheringham Museum.

We donated a second lifeboat in 1994. Named the Manchester Unity of Oddfellows, the Atlantic 75 type vessel was named by Oddfellows Chairman (Grand Master) JW Goulding. It was the first Atlantic 75 lifeboat to be placed on service by the RNLI. Spending 13 years on station, the lifeboat made 115 launches and saved 15 lives.

The Oddfellows 2007 is the third vessel funded and donated by The Oddfellows at Sheringham. The B-Class Atlantic 85 fast response lifeboat entered service in 2007 when it was named by Secretary of the Oddfellows East Anglia Group Conference Alison Adamson. At that time, it was the most modern state-of-the-art class of inshore lifeboat in the RNLI fleet.

The cost of this third vessel was £135,000. The Oddfellows also raised £68,000 for the required new drive-on, drive-off launch and recovery carriage and £147,000 for the amphibious tractor.

This lifeboat's size is 8.3m x 2.75m (27 feet x nine feet one inch) and its speed is 35 knots (40mph). It houses four crew: Helmsman, Radio Operator, navigator and a fourth member. Its technology: Radar, Chart Plotter, VHF Radio Direction Finder. The Oddfellows has a manually operated, self-righting mechanism that

inflates a large airbag with compressed air. The engines are inversion-proofed and can be restarted following a capsize.

As at 15 December 2015, the lifeboat had made 56 launches saving three lives.

Memory Lane by Joyce Austin

During the Blitz the office of the largest Lodge in South London, The Loyal Pride of Clapham Lodge, was bombed and sadly the secretary, Simpson was killed. Our Dad, Howard Coombe, was asked to take over the secretaryship. He had been working for many years for a Bermondsey company of Leather Merchants as bookkeeper and his salary in a commercial company was more than a Friendly Society could pay. We had a 'family conference' and because Dad was a devoted Odd Fellow (always spelt like that in the old days) we all knew that he wanted to do it.

He had to compile the account books from scratch since all the records were destroyed and was aided in the task by local residents bringing him scraps of charred paper and record books that they found in their gardens after the bomb had fallen on Stonhouse Street.

In 1942 I had been evacuated for three years and begged Dad to let me stay at home since the raids were now less frequent than earlier. I was therefore able to go to Clapham to work with him. I found it fascinating and loved it. He often cycled to Clapham from Lee and one day suggested that we both went on the tandem instead of the tram. I was terrified. We weaved in and out of cars and the trams alongside felt huge. I remember he was very hurt because I didn't trust him!!!

He was conscripted into the Royal Marines at the end of 1942 but returned to



Clapham after he was demobbed in 1945. In 1948 when the new NHS was formed lodge secretaries who understood the National Insurance system were called into the new Ministry of National Insurance to work and Dad had to leave.



Since in those days the Lord Byron was a men only lodge I had to leave the juvenile section and joined the Frances Evelyn Lodge which met in Deptford. I became assistant secretary to Sister Rose Trot and took the CAMU exam to become an auditor. I worked as a bookkeeper all my life and loved it I always said it was like doing a jigsaw puzzle. And all because I had helped Dad sort out the Pride of Clapham books.

This is a Shortland Bowen wall hanging oak barometer and dial thermometer. It is an early gauge by Shortland Bowen, listed in their catalogue of c1934 as model J116. Its price was '95/-', or £4.75 today.



It was a Manchester Unity of Independent Odd Fellows presentation piece to a Past Provincial Grand Master, with a silver plated plaque engraved, 'Presented to P.P.G.M. R. PEARMAIN by the Loyal Widows Protection Lodge, M.U.I.O.O.F., in recognition of his services to the Lodge and Cambridge District. 1948'. The 11cm square dial aneroid barometer is graduated in inches Hg. The 8cm dial thermometer is a Rototherm.

Both dials carry the Shortland Bowen logo. The back has a hanger at the top, measuring approximately 23.5 cms x 32 cms.

Changes To Convalescence And Care Benefits

Following an annual review of the discretionary membership benefits by the Oddfellows' Fraternal Board, some changes have been made to the Convalescence Care Benefit, Carer's Respite Benefit and Convalescence Home Benefit. These changes have been made due to an increase in applications and are necessary to ensure the long-term sustainability of the benefits available.

These benefits are available after two years of membership and every two years from then on. From 1 January 2025, when a successful and eligible convalescence/ care application is made, the following will be covered:

The Convalescence Care Benefit

Will cover a stay of up to one week in a convalescence facility agreed by the Society.





The Convalescence Home Benefit

Will cover up to 15 hours of help at home or other services or equipment to help recovery (capped at a maximum of £500).

Carer's Respite Benefit

Will cover a stay of up to one week in a convalescence facility agreed by the Society or replacement care of up to 15 hours (capped at a maximum of £500) to provide a break for a member who is a full-time carer for a family member.

These changes became applicable for new Convalescence, Carer's Respite and Home Care Benefit cases from 1 January 2025.

A member's annual membership fee must be paid and up-to-date in order for them to make an application and access the benefit.

Green Street Green

I was interested to read in the recent 'Out & About' about the visit to Green Street Green. I know it well, having lived there for the first 22 years of my life. My parents (both from the Peckham area) moved there after their marriage in 1936, buying a bungalow in Glentrammon Road – near the World's End Lane end of the road.

My parents were both Oddfellows having been introduced to the Society by the Jarrett family – they were in the Loyal Gordon Lodge. My mother was at school with Mabel and the families remained close friends until their deaths. My grandparents were bombed out of their Peckham home and also moved to Green Street Green, renting and later buying a house in Glentrammon Road. My parents eventually moved in with my grandmother and stayed there until they 'downsized' in 1986.

My mother's sister worked for several years at the former brewery – Telcon Plastics. I remember the building of Brittenden Close – designed by an architect (Mr Rose) who lived in Chelsfield Hill. Waitrose occupies the site of what was once Penfold's Coaches. There is still quite a lot that has not changed although the shops have changed hands. There were 2 shoe menders in the village. I was rather scared of both of them, but I came to realise that both had been veterans of WW1 and had been injured.

In the late 40s and early 50s there was always a May Queen festival held on Hayes Common. Green Street Green sent a May Queen and attendants. I took part in 2 such festivals. The London May Queen arriving by horsedrawn coach. We would gather cowslips and primroses from the hill at the back of Old Lane, walking up what was known as 'the chalk path'. These we made into posies to carry with our long white dresses and headdresses – all very springlike. I do still have photos of this should you be interested. I was baptised at St. Mary's (the Reverend Jocelyn was then the incumbent) but I went to Sunday school at the Baptist Church as the children next door went and I was bundled off with them!

For most of my time there Glentrammon Road was 'unadopted' – unmade – full of flints and potholes and rough stones which one got to know. The lamplighter came to light the gas lamps in the road – pushing his bike! There were a few shops scattered down World's End Lane – now all gone. I never found Green Street Green a very attractive village although the Green end was always nice to walk. I did visit last year when catching up with some friends but as I now live in Shetland it's a bit of a journey! I have gone on a bit, but the article did stir a few memories and it's good to see there are still Oddfellows in the village.

April to May: The tax refund scam

With key tax deadlines passing, fraudsters may take advantage of taxpayers hoping for a refund. You may receive emails, phone calls or text messages claiming you're due reimbursement.

Verify any tax-related communication through official government channels before responding to avoid being caught out.

Summer scams: Holidays, events and ticket fraud

From June to August, scammers often aim to exploit the excitement of summer holiday planning by offering fake 'not to be missed' deals on accommodation and flights, often through unofficial websites.

Concert and sporting event fraud is also on the up, and attempts to sell fake tickets on social media platforms are becoming increasingly common. Avoid these traps by booking through reputable travel agencies and official events websites.

August to September: Back to school scams

As students and their families prepare for a new school year, fraudsters like to create fake offers for school supplies, loans and student rental accommodation.

If an offer seems too good to be true, verify it with official sources before taking action.

Stay vigilant year-round

While some scams are season-specific, fraudsters are always on the lookout for their next victim.



Stay informed, be sceptical of unsolicited requests for money or personal information, and always verify who you're dealing with before taking action.
