

Provincial Grand Master's Message



I feel very privileged to have been the first Provincial Grand Master (Chairman) of Derby District to conduct an electronic District Meeting.

It is at the District meeting that I would normally have let you know my chosen charity, but as you are all aware I have chosen Derbyshire Blood Bikes last year. I am so pleased that I did, given the phenomenal increase in their usage during 2020. They supported the huge efforts to get Covid-19 samples between hospitals and testing facilities and they were heavily involved in delivering PPE to care setting and GP surgeries. Not only did they transport blood for Blood Banks, but they also helped Pathology Labs, Pharmacies, Maternity and the Gynaecology Departments.

In 2020 they carried out over 8,000 deliveries for our NHS, that was more than they had done collectively in the previous eight years since they began operating in 2012. Their biggest headache last year was fundraising, most of their fundraising is done face to face at supermarkets or giving talks to small groups like ourselves. I am pleased to

say that down to your kind generosity we have managed to raise just over £1,500 for them to date. Thank you.

As we pass the anniversary of what has been a tough year for all of us, I'm pleased that we can finally see the light at the end of the tunnel. The vaccination programme is underway and most of our members have had their first dose of the vaccine and it seems to be taking effect. We have also had the government's four step road map to help us start to plan ahead and hopefully this will provide us with a route back to some sort of normal life.

Our Social Committee hopes to start planning face to face social events very soon, as we cannot wait to welcome everyone back to social events in the hall. Hopefully, this will be no later than mid July.

Although online events are probably here to stay, as they are now a valued part of what we offer our members with over 100 events to choose from. This is a great achievement considering that we hadn't any events online prior to April last year.

Finally, I'd like to say how proud I am of our Society's members for the way they have faced up to the uncertainty of the last 12 months. We've achieved a lot during these difficult times and I know that an incredible amount of work has been done in all our Branches, both by our staff and volunteers.



On greater inspection of the packaging the description on the labelling was - plastic buttons, so what am I going to get?



Derbyshire Blood Bikes



Derbyshire Blood Bikes is a local charity that provides a medical courier service to the local NHS hospitals and medical facilities. Mark Vallis joined the group in 2015 and soon saw the real potential for the service provided by the charity. A retired Derbyshire Police Officer, Mark, who now manages the service reflects; "In 2015 we were responding to just a few calls each week, yet I quickly learned that our main hospital was ordering over 12,000 taxi journeys each year, spending over £150,000. There was tremendous scope for us doing far more".

Today, with around 65 volunteers and a fleet of 12 motorcycles and three cars, they now frequently respond to around 35 calls each day and in 2020, the fleet travelled over 230,000 miles.

The group provides a 24/7 service with volunteers freely contributing their time to the courier tasks, fundraising events or the many talks they do for local community groups. With more activity comes increased pressure on funding. They now need to raise around £35,000 to keep the service, which they provide free to the NHS, operating. They aim to save the NHS money on urgent and nonroutine transport costs.

Around half of the group's journeys take them beyond the county border, delivering essential and urgent diagnostic samples to Sheffield and Birmingham, but also to facilities in Leeds, London, Liverpool, Manchester and Bristol are used by both Derby and Chesterfield hospitals.

As well as diagnostic samples, they are also asked to carry blood and blood products, medication, equipment and records. They also transport donated breast milk from donating mothers into the national milk banks, which then supply neonatal units for poorly or premature new-born infants.

The service has grown and expanded significantly since 2016, responding to the diverse needs of the NHS in Derbyshire. For example, one of the regular parts of the service is delivering medication for the OPAT team, part of the hospital pharmacy. Mark explains; "The pharmacy

service continues to support many patients after they leave hospital, or even if they have life-long conditions and are supported by the Royal Derby Hospital. The feedback from these patient groups has been 100% positive. They're experiencing an effective service which delivers on time, with a smile and very often a doorstep chat. That's a very satisfying part of what we do".

DBB grew steadily and in 2019, made over 2,860 deliveries, more in that year than it had been since the group first started in 2011. Then Covid-19 changed almost everything.

The global health crisis had an almost immediate impact on the group.

- we had to put in place new safety measures to keep our volunteers safe
- we could not recruit and train the way we had been doing
- the demands for our service grew by over 300%
- all fundraising events were cancelled

However, many volunteers were able to commit more time to help and effective fundraising for the previous four years had left us in a good position to continue.

By the end of 2020, we'd made over 8,200 deliveries, again eclipsing all we'd previously done.

What does the future hold for Derbyshire Blood Bikes? The aim for the group is to be the medical courier service of choice for the NHS in Derbyshire. With the resources and volunteers, Mark is confident the group are well on the way to achieving that.

But above all, like the rest of society, we just hope for a return to some normality!

is based in Kilburn. The photo shows Ralph holding his prize. Ralph is a full time carer for his wife. Congratulations, it was a pleasure to meet you.



Branches raise over £145,000 for good causes in 2020

A big part of the Oddfellows is about giving back. We're run by our members, for our members, and that means providing them with the support they, their friends, family and communities may need.

The societal impact of the worldwide pandemic and nationwide lockdowns truly showed us the importance of coming together as a community. And despite many facing funding and resource crises themselves, charitable organisations stepped up to play a huge part in helping people to get through the struggles of last year.

To show our continued support, our UK Branches raised £145,742.59 for good causes in 2020.

Jane Nelson, CEO of the Oddfellows, says: "In one way or another, we've all needed somebody to lean on at various points during the pandemic, so it's wonderful to see how our Branches and members have been helping their local communities and good causes."

Oddfellows Branches and members also made significant contributions to Society fundraising initiatives during the past year, such as our Coronavirus Emergency Appeal, in which £19,210 was raised to split between The Silver Line and the National Emergencies Trust.

Our 115 UK Branches regularly donate to a long list of local organisations and charities. From supporting homeless shelters through to funding public defibrillators, they work tirelessly to help make their towns great places to live for people of all ages, from all walks of life. Here are a few examples...

Nottingham Trent Oddfellows
Sponsored a local mum with £550 who
was raising money for the Children with

Cancer charity by running a marathon across town. Every day, 12 families are given the heartbreaking news that their child has cancer, and CWC funds over 60 research projects which all work towards giving children the very best chance of survival.



Mid-Staffordshire Oddfellows donated £1,000 to Midland Air Ambulance Charity, which has air bases in Staffordshire, Shropshire and Worcestershire, and provides emergency care in hard-to-reach places.



The Great Berkhampstead District donated £2,000 to a local school last year that runs a charity called "No Child Without". Many children were left at a disadvantage following school closures, due to a lack of access to tablets and laptops at home. No Child Without makes sure that every child has the basic necessities to learn, no matter their background.

Nene and Welland Oddfellows raised £1,000, plus £400 worth of food and bedding for the Exotic Pet Refuge, which runs entirely on public donations to support its menagerie of wolves, snakes, monkeys and meerkats —

to name a few!



North Gloucestershire Oddfellows donated £6,000 to Merton House Hotel to get it back on its feet after early closures in 2020 due to government restrictions. Merton House Hotel offers respite and convalescence care to a number of Oddfellows members.



Leigh and Bolton Oddfellows donated £500 to Bolton Hospice, which offers local support for people with lifelimiting or terminal illnesses. The hospice costs £4 million per year to provide its specialist care.
