

This was a thought provoking performance which told the story about a group of young females who highlighted the poor treatment of asylum seekers living in Glasgow.

In February we visited the Giffnock Synagogue where our guide explained some of the history of the Glasgow Jewish community and of their religion and customs. After our tour we had a lovely lunch at the Orchard Park Hotel where we were joined by a few other members.

A coach trip in March took us to visit to the Bannockburn Experience followed by some free time to have a wander and



lunch in Stirling. Interestingly, whilst in the Bannockburn visitors centre, there was an exhibit showing a picture and explanation of how in 1870 the lodges of the Oddfellows Dumbarton and Stirling erected a 120ft flagpole to help visitors locate the site.


The "Refer a Friend" Award for the highest number of member advocates was awarded to Ormskirk and Southport Branch, with 31 members recruiting a new member in 2018

Bill has some sound words of advice to welcome the new Grand Master, David Randall: "Be yourself and enjoy the year, it goes very quickly!"




