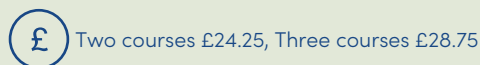

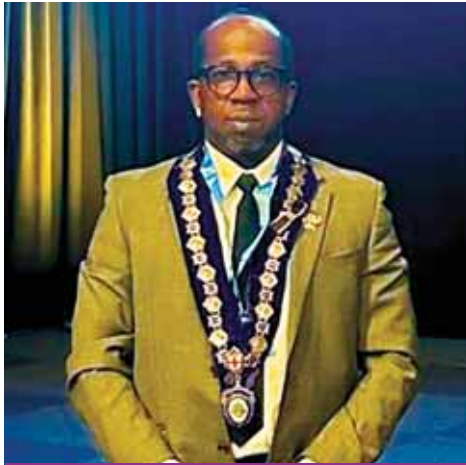


Art Unscrewed

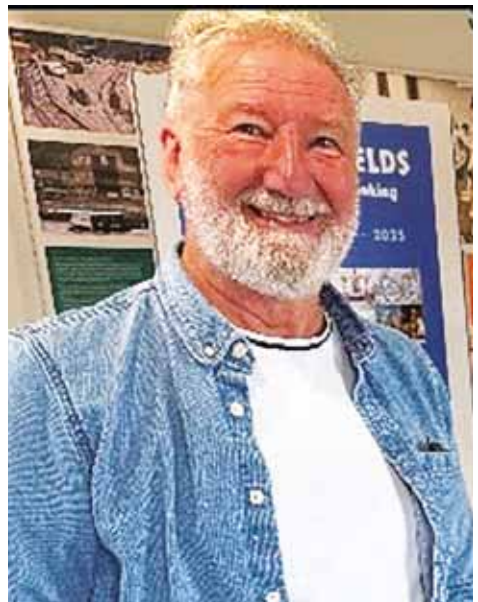
Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Obituary - Joyce Caplin

We are saddened to report the passing of Joyce Caplin.

It can truly be said that Joyce was a person who made a difference. Her contribution to North London District Oddfellows was immense. In its 190 years, the District has awarded only 37 District Merit Jewels recognising such contributions. Joyce is one of the recipients.

Joyce took an active part in Oddfellows activities in north London right from the beginning of her membership. She acted as Secretary for two Lodges/Branches, her own - Good Samaritan - and Good Companions). She passed through the Chairs of the Branch and served on various District Committees, representing North London at Oddfellows Regional and national Annual Movable Conferences. Joyce was elected as Provincial Grand Master (District Chairman) for the first time in 1995 repeating this role in later years.

Joyce worked as Assistant District Secretary to District Secretary Derek Elmer, latterly at our office in Highbury Place.

Joyce and Derek retired and moved to Broxbourne in Hertfordshire at the end of 2011. They continued to host Good



Samaritan Branch committee and social events every fortnight, despite an hour's drive each way. They also attended the monthly meeting of two other Branches and supported two social groups.

Joyce's commitment from grass roots to national level and the ease with which she could help all members says much about Joyce herself.

Someone once said that we learn something new every day. I don't know who said it, but I feel sure that is something I will learn on another day.



What I really want to tell you about, is, what I learned today.

Oddfellows Memorabilia

Continuing our look at Oddfellows Memorabilia, here are two rare Oddfellows jewels. They commemorate the centenary of the Oddfellows in 1910.

The first was engraved and presented to 'A F Oberall PPGM Jan 1911'. The front of the jewel bears the words. 'Manchester Unity 1810 CY 1910 IOOF with the title bar, '1810 MUIOOF 1910'.



The second medal was produced in 1910 to recognise 100 years of the Manchester Unity of Oddfellows. It is of silver-gilt and enamel and was made by Spencer of London and has a Birmingham hallmark for 1910.

The Oddfellows 1910 Annual Movable Conference was held in Southampton and presided by Grand Master Edward Bourne.



Bob Sinfield Remembers Peter Sellers

Inspector Clouseau, Major Bloodnok, Dr Strangelove, even James Bond: these characters and so many others were brought to life by one of film and radio comedy's greatest names, Peter Sellers. Whenever I get the chance to address an Oddfellows gathering on the subject of this extraordinary performer, I jump at it (no mean feat at my age).

Born 100 years ago to theatrical parents who toured the country as a variety act, young Peter seemed destined to make his mark as a comedian and impersonator. But at that time, the talkies were in their infancy and wireless mirth was strictly rationed by the dour Lord Reith, so it wasn't until the post-war era that he broke into BBC radio by phoning a top Light Entertainment producer and pretending to be Kenneth Horne. His mimicry was so convincing that it led to a glittering - if poorly paid - comedy career in 'steam' broadcasting, notably on the long-running Goon Show.

Cinema success beckoned and in the 1960s, he became an international star, sharing the screen – and romantic scenes – with the likes of Sophia Loren...but he found it hard to distinguish fantasy from reality and went round telling the world that Sophia was in love with him. Nobody believed this, especially not her.

Still, he really did get to play the ultimate ladies' man, 007, in a massively unpopular



version of Casino Royale where he refused to appear on the set with Orson Welles despite being in the same scene as him. Worse disasters were to follow and, by the early '70s, he had a string of box-office flops behind him, plus three broken marriages and a fourth one on the way.

It was then that he decided to make a pirate comedy caper called Ghost in the Noonday Sun. His plan was to shoot the picture on a ship off the coast of Cyprus. Fellow Goon Spike Milligan was drafted in to work on the script and a young Hungarian director called Peter Medak tried his best to call the shots and cope with the increasingly erratic behaviour of the star. Everything went wrong from the first day and when completed, it

was deemed to be so bad that Columbia Pictures refused to release it.

Some good did come of it, though. While on Cyprus, Sellers made a commercial for Benson & Hedges (you could do that then), wearing a Clouseau-style overcoat. This led to a revival of the bungling French detective so beloved of slapstick fans. Peter Sellers was back on top.

So, a happy ending, then...of sorts. It was short-lived, though, and so was he. Sellers died of a coronary in 1980 at the shockingly early age of 54. I've been a fan of his since childhood and am still an enormous admirer of his outstanding gifts as a character actor...but knowing what I do of how difficult he could be, I'm very glad I never had to make a film with him!
