



Chairman's Letter



Dear Sisters and Brothers

May I say, it is a privilege to stand before you today as your District Chairman. I'm genuinely filled with gratitude and pride as I reflect on all that you have accomplished in helping our society. I refer to all those whose relentless activities and hard work that bring together the important

membership without which our society would not function.

When I speak of our Order, I speak of its great legacy, our fellowship is not found in history books; it is built by each of you, every single day, with every act of kindness and every moment of companionship.

I finish this letter with a poem I found which mirrors in my opinion what Oddfellowship is all about.



Bob Sinfield Remembers Peter Sellers

Inspector
Clouseau, Major
Bloodnok, Dr.
Strangelove,
even James
Bond: these
characters and
so many others
were brought



to life by one of film and radio comedy's greatest names, Peter Sellers. Whenever I get the chance to address an Oddfellows gathering on the subject of this extraordinary performer, I jump at it (no mean feat at my age).

Born 100 years ago to theatrical parents who toured the country as a variety act, young Peter seemed destined to make his mark as a comedian and impersonator. But at that time, the talkies were in their infancy and wireless mirth was strictly rationed by the dour Lord Reith, so it wasn't until the post-war era that he broke into BBC radio by phoning a top Light Entertainment producer and pretending to be Kenneth Horne. His mimicry was so convincing that it led to a glittering - if poorly paid - comedy career in 'steam' broadcasting, notably on the long-running Goon Show.

Cinema success beckoned and in the 1960s, he became an international star, sharing the screen – and romantic scenes – with the likes of Sophia Loren...but he found it hard to distinguish fantasy from reality and went round telling the world that Sophia was in love with him. Nobody believed this, especially not her.

Still, he really did get to play the ultimate ladies' man, 007, in a massively unpopular version of Casino Royale where he refused to appear on the set with Orson Welles despite being in the same scene as him. Worse disasters were to follow and, by the early '70s, he had a string of boxoffice flops behind him, plus three broken marriages and a fourth one on the way.

It was then that he decided to make a pirate comedy caper called Ghost in the Noonday Sun. His plan was to shoot the picture on a ship off the coast of Cyprus. Fellow Goon Spike Milligan was drafted in to work on the script and a young Hungarian director called Peter Medak tried his best to call the shots and cope with the increasingly erratic behaviour of the star. Everything went wrong from the first day and when completed, it was deemed to be so bad that Columbia Pictures refused to release it.

Some good did come of it, though. While on Cyprus, Sellers made a commercial for Benson & Hedges (you could do that then), wearing a Clouseau-style overcoat. This led to a revival of the bungling French detective so beloved of slapstick fans. Peter Sellers was back on top.

So, a happy ending, then...of sorts. It was short-lived, though, and so was he. Sellers died of a coronary in 1980 at the shockingly early age of 54. I've been a fan of his since childhood and am still an enormous admirer of his outstanding gifts as a character actor...but knowing what I do of how difficult he could be, I'm very glad I never had to make a film with him!





As I bent down to retrieve the poor creature, which was attempting to run for its life as I'm sure it was petrified, I caught it in my tissue and assured it all was well,

that it was safe and I would find it some nice greenery and earth outside where it could scamper



about and be safe. At the exact moment out came my doctor to call me in for my appointment.

"Can you just give me a moment", I asked him as the spider wriggled around trying to free itself from the tissue I had placed around it. "There's a spider here and rather than get swept up, I'll just take it outside".

Memory Lane

Mottingham Branch member recalls the building of Oddfellows Hall at Mottingham.

John Wellington was born in Dorst Road in Mottingham, the neighbouring road to the Oddfellows Hall in Beaconsfield Road. However, the hall didn't appear until later.

John recalls that he started school at Dorset Road at the age of four. A few years later, he moved to the big school in Mottingham which was next to Martins Bank and opposite the Porcupine public house, which is now a supermarket. The school was closed when it was hit by a flying bomb in 1944. (The bank was the first branch of Martins to suffer an armed robbery, in 1967.)

John commenced an apprenticeship with J Stones of Deptford, the marine and railway engineering company and left after ten years' service.

Older members of Oddfellows' Mottingham Lodge had bought some land to build a hall. The land was used as allotments. A builder's yard, where doors and windows were made was next door. The yard has long been covered by two houses.

Chislehurst and Sidcup Urban District Council were responsible for building permission at that time. Their preferred option was to build a school on the site rather than a hall. The Oddfellows had quite a fight to obtain permission for the



hall to be built before it was eventually agreed. Construction began in 1956.

The architect was Ted Wilson and outside builders were used to build the hall. It was constructed in stages. Initially, the hall front was built. It included a kitchen, cloak room and toilets. As further funding became available, there were two further builds of three bays, five years apart.

The hall has parking for several cars. Oddfellows ephemera is displayed on its walls, including certificates of early days of Mottingham Lodge, a unique 'three links' clock, made by Bro Lovelock and a photo of members outside the building at its opening 69 years ago. Looks like there'll be a big birthday to celebrate next year!

Another interesting feature is that a mausoleum was opposite the hall. Although it was bombed in WWII, three gravestones are laid flat on the grass there and can be viewed from the pavement.
