Angela Linda Hooker

Past Provincial Grand Master (Past District Chairman) 6 September 1947 to 8 March 2021



We are saddened to report on the loss of Angela Hooker. At the time of her passing, 'Angie' held the position of North London District Secretary of the Oddfellows. However, she has filled many other executive positions in the Oddfellows from the very start of her Oddfellows life.

Angie was initiated into the Pride of Islington in September 1983. She took an immediate interest in Branch affairs, becoming Noble Grand in 1985 and 1987 and more times. She took the Purple Degree in 1986.

Angie was made permanent Director of Ceremonies in 1989 and elected Lodge Sick Visitor in 1995. She joined the North London District Past Grands Lodge in 1986 and was elected Secretary to that Lodge in 1989. She was also a Member of the James Roe Provincial Lodge of Past Grands and Worthy Master in 1995. Angie was also a member of the Amacitia Provincial Lodge of Past Grands and Worthy Master in 1996.

Her other committee roles included being a member of the Northern and Hackney Degree Lodge. She also became Secretary of the West Central Minor Degree Lodge in 1994 and as a member of the North London Secretaries Association, its President in 1995. She was also Auditor for the National Federation of Administer Officers.

Her official Oddfellows continued. Angie was a member of the Metropolitan District Officers Association. She was elected to serve on the North London District Juvenile Advisory Committee from 1984 to 1989.

Elected to the District Committee of Management in 1987, Angie became Provincial Grand Master in 1991, 1998 and 2008. She was elected to the Friendly Societies Convalescent Home Advisory Committee from 1990 to 1994, was District representative to the Friends of the MBSA 1992 to 1994, and was elected to the District Publicity and Propaganda Committee in 1992 to 1994. Angie also

served on the North London District Book Examiners Committee from 1991 to 1995.

Angie continued to absorb herself in Oddfellows officialdom when she became Deputy to the London and Home Counties Group Conference 1991 to 1995 and to the Executive Committee 1995.

The dedication that Angie showed was rewarded when she received the District Merit Jewel in 1996.

Angie was elected as a District Deputy to the Oddfellows Annual Movable Conference (AMC) 1989 and has continued to fulfil that role. She was elected as a Deputy to the Southern Group Conference in 2003 and as Deputy to the Metropolitan Group Conference from 2001 continuously. She has served on the District Social and Development Committee. Angie was appointed Secretary of the Flower of Hendon Branch in 2000, serving until amalgamation in 2017. She has also served and supported Credit Union No 1 in London and Credit Union No 2 in Leamington Spa.

Angie was elected to Unity (National Oddfellows) Special Arbitrator 2011 and 2015. She was elected Trustee of the North London District in 2003 and Provincial Corresponding Secretary in 2013.

In addition, she attended many Weekend Seminars for the District and Branch.

Angie has always been a very strong supporter of our Ritual, attending Degree Lodges and Provincial Lodge of Past Grands whenever possible. She was always willing to help new members gain further knowledge in Oddfellowship.

North London District will commemorate Angie when lockdown measures are over. As a short tribute, we dedicated a Zoom presentation about the 1970s to Angie the week after she passed. We read this dedication, Angie's own words showing her reaction to an article that appeared in the e-magazine, about her happy youth:

'I must comment about 'Girls Holiday'. I have just spent the last half hour walking down memory lane to my years spent during the 60s, 70s and 80s. Some made me smile and some did bring a tear but I quite clearly recall the fun of fashion, freedom and to the 70's hippy generation of which I was one – the 60s was the beginnings of a very changing world of attitudes and care for our planet. Yes it was us during the 60s and 70s who most strongly protested our values and philosophies against war and climate changes.

"Nothing explains our fears for the future more than in the song produced/released in 1968 and again in 1969 called In the Year 2525 by Zager and Evans. In August 1969 many of us were still remembering the Woodstock concert at Bethel outside New York with Jimi Hendrix, Crosby, Stills & Nash, Janis Joplin, Joan Baez, the Who and many many more. Anyway that was the happiest and nostalgic half hour I have spent since this world wide disaster which we have all experienced one way or another".

At the start of lockdown, Our District realised that we had to keep members in touch in every way possible: phone, email, text, letter and postcards. Two new initiatives have been to reach members online with North London District hosting two of the 40 weekly online events via Zoom and the production of a weekly e-magazine, issued every Saturday by email.

This 21 page editions have been produced every week for over a year. We're approaching half a million words! Whilst aimed at Oddfellows members, the use

of online media allows us to provide a full and varied magazine featuring many varied topics, publishing original stories and poems, members' artwork and photos, quizzes and puzzles. Feedback has been incredible, with two pages of letters every week.

Oddfellows Memorabilia


It wasn't until the 1700s that
Europeans were able to make
porcelain. The Industrial Revolution
from about 1760 had a great effect
with its mass produced goods.
Inexpensive, mass produced
pottery took the place of items
crafted by hand. In the 19th century,
pottery became very popular
for everyday household and
commemorative items.

Pottery was produced to mark special occasions, celebrate events and organisations. Thousands of examples of Oddfellows porcelain pieces were made. These included items manufactured as pearlware or 'china glaze', a light coloured pottery. This process had been started in the mid 1750s and was developed Wedgewood about 1780. The pictures show examples of this ware, probably made in the 1825 to 1850 period.



This tankard was made from pearlware. The mug has been decorated with the Oddfellows crest.





This jug was probably made in the 1830 to 1840 period. The pictures show opposite sides of the item.



This flare necked jug, perhaps made by Hicks and Meigh between 1825 and 1835, is transfer printed and enamelled on each side with the Oddfellows crest. It is painted with two groups of roses and inscribed John Hulme Millwright on the reverse. It has a gilt rim and handle and is about 12cms/5 inches high.



This china beaker was made for Burton on Trent District to commemorate the Centenary Celebration of the Oddfellows in 1910. The item was manufactured by Grafton China (A B Jones of Stoke on Trent), just 30 miles from Burton. The piece has fluting to the body and a crimped, flared top edge trimmed with gilding.

We've teamed up with national advice specialists Citizens Advice to give our members access to two of its experienced, full-time advisors – so help is just a phone call away.

Receiving help and advice through the Oddfellows Citizens Advice Line is a membership benefit from day one.

It's an 0800 number, so free to call from a landline or mobile. It operates 9.30am to 4.30pm Monday to Friday. An answerphone service is available outside of these hours and, rest assured, all messages will be replied to the next working day.

Where can I find the Oddfellows Citizens Advice Line number?

It's a member-only number which can be found on your membership card or in your Member Handbook. Members can also access it by signing in to the Members' Area or by calling our Membership team or their Branch.

What advice is available?

The line's advisors are there to help you understand your rights and guide you through any problems. They can help you with everything from one-off queries and full welfare benefit checks, to complex money or housing problems. Their database contains helpful information on over 15,000 subjects, but these are the most frequently discussed issues:

Welfare benefits – if you're struggling to make ends meet on a pension or low wage, unemployed, have a disability or long-term health condition, then they can check if there is any other support you could be receiving. They can also help you to make a welfare benefit claim, as well as sort out problems and challenge decisions if things go wrong.

Housing – if you're facing a housing issue, such as problems with a landlord, neighbours or harassment, they can offer advice on your legal rights, negotiation and advocacy as required. They can also give information on help available for older or vulnerable people with home repairs or heating costs.

Debt and money advice – if you're facing financial difficulties, such as redundancy or a cut in income, or finding

it hard to pay your mortgage, credit card or other household bills, they can give you advice on how to manage creditors, debt and budgeting.

Employment issues – if you're facing redundancy or unfair dismissal, or experiencing other difficult problems at work, they can offer advice. They can also help you access mediation and refer you to specialist employment advice and representation through the Oddfellows' Legal Aid Scheme where appropriate.

Consumer goods and services – if you're having problems with goods that are not fit-for-purpose, or issues with service providers and contracts, they can give help and advice on enforcing your rights.

Family matters – if you're having difficulties, such as going through divorce proceedings or access to your children or grandchildren following separation, they can offer initial advice and support.

Legal and taxation frameworks – if you need general help to understand how the legal system works and your rights, they can help you with a wide range of issues, such as civil rights, education and tax problems.

Branches raise over £145,000 for good causes in 2020

A big part of the Oddfellows is about giving back. We're run by our members, for our members, and that means providing them with the support they, their friends, family and communities may need.

The societal impact of the worldwide pandemic and nationwide lockdowns truly showed us the importance of coming together as a community. And despite many facing funding and resource crises themselves, charitable organisations stepped up to play a huge part in helping people to get through the struggles of last year.

To show our continued support, our UK Branches raised £145,742.59 for good causes in 2020.

Jane Nelson, CEO of the Oddfellows, says: "In one way or another, we've all needed somebody to lean on at various points during the pandemic, so it's wonderful to see how our Branches and members have been helping their local communities and good causes."

Oddfellows Branches and members also made significant contributions to Society fundraising initiatives during the past year, such as our Coronavirus Emergency Appeal, in which £19,210 was raised to split between The Silver Line and the National Emergencies Trust.

Our 115 UK Branches regularly donate to a long list of local organisations and charities. From supporting homeless shelters through to funding public defibrillators, they work tirelessly to help make their towns great places to live for people of all ages, from all walks of life. Here are a few examples...

Nottingham Trent Oddfellows

Sponsored a local mum with £550 who was raising money for the Children with Cancer charity by running a marathon across town. Every day, 12 families are given the heartbreaking news that their child has cancer, and CWC funds over 60 research projects which all work towards giving children the very best chance of survival.

donated £1,000 to Midland Air Ambulance Charity, which has air bases in Staffordshire, Shropshire and Worcestershire, and provides emergency care in hard-to-reach places.



The Great Berkhampstead District donated £2,000 to a local school last year that runs a charity called "No Child Without". Many children were left at a disadvantage following school closures, due to a lack of access to tablets and laptops at home. No Child Without makes sure that every child has the basic necessities to learn, no matter their background.

Nene and Welland Oddfellows raised £1,000, plus £400 worth of food and bedding for the Exotic Pet Refuge, which runs entirely on public donations to support its menagerie of wolves, snakes, monkeys and meerkats – to name a few!



North Gloucestershire Oddfellows donated £6,000 to Merton House Hotel to get it back on its feet after early closures in 2020 due to government restrictions. Merton House Hotel offers respite and convalescence care to a number of Oddfellows members.



Leigh and Bolton Oddfellows donated £500 to Bolton Hospice, which offers local support for people with lifelimiting or terminal illnesses. The hospice costs £4 million per year to provide its specialist care.
