## Wine Tasting with Cheese



Our Cheese and Wine event was a little different this time. The usual variety of cheeses were on offer to try, but the wine was more of a test.

Alice had made us all spreadsheets to say what type of wine it was and our preference. There was an expensive and cheaper variety of each type of wine. She had even provided 'spit buckets!'

## Wills and Power of Attorney

At the June Coffee Morning Alice's husband Luke Smyth came along to talk to us about wills and power of attorney. Luke is a solicitor specialising in this field, in his words "the dead, dying and in between". He dealt with a very serious issue in a light hearted and easy way to understand – 'Pop your clogs' comes from sell your shoes, you don't need them when you are dead!

He informed us that only 54% of adults actually have a will. The longest ever will was 1,066 pages long, written in 1913 which took seven years to administer. The shortest was three words long – 'everything to wife'. You cannot leave everything to your dog (or any other pet) as they cannot have a bank account, but you can have something in trust for them. Your debts do not die with you and need to be settled from your estate. You cannot inherit if you cause the person's death (murder) and if you leave money to a UK charity there is no inheritance tax on this.

Luke also dealt with the laws of Power of Attorney, a very important decision to ensure you are cared for as you would wish if you became mentally incapacitated in later life.

Luke was not at the Coffee Morning to sell anything, but he works for Ellis Fermor and Negus and does do home visits if necessary. Thanks to Luke for a very interesting morning.

### Last Will and Testament

I suppose, one day, I will be dead and go to meet my maker. So have this note set in my hand, there for the undertaker. Don't dress me in a shroud of white or rouge my cheeks all red. It is not right, to look a fright, e'en though you're stone cold dead.

## Chocolate Peanut Butter (no bake) bar

#### Ingredients

250g smooth peanut butter 100g ground almonds 100g porridge oats 6tbsp maple syrup 1tsp vanilla extract Pinch of sea salt



180g dark chocolate roughly broken 1tbsp smooth peanut butter Flaky sea salt for sprinkling Optional topping

### Method

1. Line a small tin or dish (about 15cm x 8cm or square equivalent) with greaseproof paper, making sure it

comes up high enough on the sides so that you can lift the mixture out of the tine once it's set.

- 2. Mix the peanut butter, ground almonds, oats, maple syrup, vanilla and salt together in a bowl. Transfer to the lined tin, pressing down with the back of a spoon or spatula to make it even and compact.
- **3.** For the chocolate layer melt the chocolate. Once melted, stir through the peanut butter and pour this evenly over the base.
- **4.** If topping with the whole peanuts, scatter these over the chocolate layer. Sprinkle over a little pinch of flaky salt.
- 5. Set in the fridge for one hour or until firm, then cut into 16 pieces to serve.

#### **Interesting facts**

In the Domesday Book, an extensive land survey from 1086 the area we know as Stratford was called 'Street Forda' meaning 'ford on a Roman Road'.

The town was first settled by the Germanic Hwiccas tribe after first written reference to it dates back to 693-717. Other notable events in the town's history include the rebuilding of the church in stone in the 11th century, the awarding of Holy Trinity status as 'collegiate' by King Henry V in 1415, and the development of new streets in the 18th century.

The town is the birthplace and burial place of Shakespeare, the famous playwright, born in 1564 and died in 1616. Shakespeare and his wife, Anne Hathaway, are buried in the Church of the Holy Trinity. Millions of people visit the town each year to celebrate Shakespeare's life and work.

The programme Shakespeare and Hathaway: Private Investigators, is filmed in Stratford, an oddball couple of private detectives named Luella Shakespeare and Frank Hathaway who investigate crime in Stratford.

The oldest pub in Stratford is called The Garrick which dates back to the 1400s.

## Survey reveals UK's financial worries

Unity Mutual, the Oddfellows' financial services brand, recently surveyed 2,000 people throughout the UK to uncover what's keeping them up at night when it comes to their finances. Here's what they discovered. Do any of these resonate with you?

#### Cost of living

The worry peaks for those aged 40-49, with 63% feeling the pinch, closely followed by those in their 50s and 60s (both at 62%).

#### **Emergency planning**

35% of those surveyed worry they don't have enough money set aside for emergencies like car repairs or medical treatments. Additionally, 28% fret about potential home repair costs.

#### Pension and retirement

Living on a tight pension is a reality for 22% of respondents, and 18% worry they

aren't contributing enough to their pension pot. Many in their 60s regret not paying more into their pensions earlier.

#### Savings and financial planning

Only 39% of people have money in savings or investments, but this number jumps to 61% for those in their 70s. Yet, just a third have a financial life plan.

#### **Stress and anxiety**

Financial stress affects 58% of respondents. Those in their 60s and 70s are less worried compared to younger age groups, with only 35% and 27% respectively reporting anxiety.

#### Financial regrets

Over half (51%) have financial regrets, including not saving enough each month (46%) and spending on pointless things (43%). Interestingly, more than one in 10 (12%) wish they'd married someone with more money.



These findings show that, while financial worries are largely universal, planning and saving can make a significant difference, especially as we age. Whether you're setting up your first financial plan or adjusting your retirement strategy, it's never too late to take control of your financial future.
