

100 Years Young

In May, Bill and I, had the privilege to visit Joyce Wood to honour her 100th Birthday; Bill as Grand Master to present the Oddfellows celebration telegram and me to present flowers from the District. We enjoyed a very pleasant hour with Joyce and her lovely daughter Jane, reminiscing, of course.

Joyce Catherine Wood moved into Kyte's Lane Cottage, Smalley, Derbyshire at the age of six months in November 1919. This was to be her home until August 2018 when she became a resident at Smalley Hall Care Home.

She attended Smalley Girls' School and has been a life long member of the congregation at St John the Baptist Church, always happy to help with fund raising events, flower festivals and garden fetes and is still a member of the Mothers' Union. In 1940 Smalley Women's Institute was founded and Joyce became one of the original members.

During the war, seven year old twins Kathleen and Margaret, evacuees from Southend on Sea, lived with Joyce and her father for two years. After the war they kept in touch with Joyce and visited Smalley again, even featuring in a BBC Radio 4 Woman's Hour programme where they all spoke about their happy time spent in the Derbyshire countryside with Joyce and her father.

In April 1942, she married Walter Hopkins. They met while they were both working at Celanese at Spondon and she continued to care for her widowed father Richard. A daughter



Jane and son Nicholas arrived and when they grew older Joyce worked as a school secretary and later a welfare assistant at Smalley Richardson Endowed School. After Walter died in 1983, she continued to have a busy life always pottering in her cottage garden and enjoying holidays, both in the UK and abroad with family and friends. A member of Smalley Ramblers for many years Joyce keeps up to date with fellow members.

In October 1988, Joyce married Percy Wood, a childhood friend and next door neighbour and father of Pauline and Peter, and they lived happily together until Percy's death in 1993.

Joyce has always enjoyed being involved with her four grandchildren and she now has three great grandchildren to complete the family. Her many friends and the care home staff celebrated her 100th birthday with an afternoon tea.


Sadly Joyce has passed away recently and our sincere condolences are sent to her family.

The Oddfellows established the Orphan Gift Fund after the First World War to care for the children of members orphaned as a result of the conflicts.

The fund still exists and is part of the Society's mission to improved lives through making friends and helping people.

Derby District's own tree of remembrance is still doing well.
