In October, David Horne told thirtynine members and guests about his acting career spanning 50 years. He started as a 12 year old playing a female in A Midsummer Night's Dream – admittedly

The detective finding the body didn't realise the script had changed and said this was definitely murder as the bullet had gone straight through the heart which caused a lot of laughter from the audience. David has also appeared on TV, directed lots of plays and also worked with wellknown actors like Ian Lavender, Matthew Kelly and Su Pollard. He still enjoys pantomimes and has played an Ugly Sister with 12 costume changes which didn't always go to plan. A very interesting talk.

Pete Allen's talk to twenty-six members in November was called Lights, Camera, Ho! Ho! Ho! A Surprising Celebration of Christmas Movies. The question is what makes a Christmas

1948 he moved to a modern council estate at the age of 4. He remembered his parents putting a shilling in the meter and one of his neighbours using a cardboard piece (which

worked) until the meter was emptied and he had to pay in real money. Philip joined the St. John's Ambulance as a cadet at 10 and enjoyed many performances at the White Rock waiting for a member of the public to faint, which never happened. Once he thought he found a dead body at a fairground which turned out to be a drunk.

He joined the Bexhill Observer just before he turned 16 and was a journalist for local newspapers for 45 years with a starting salary of £6 5sh a week. When Philip was covering a meeting for a local drama group he joined them which continued for 37 years. As a journalist he once ended up in the dock with some Mods and Rockers and vowed never to wear a parka again when on duty! Philip has written several books from the History of Little Common to a Diary of Lockdown from local people supplied over 63 days.

He touched on many memorable incidents from Queen Elizabeth's visit, to running a Variety Show for the Princess of Wales Memorial Fund raising £5000.

In February, Joe Mendell entertained twenty-two members with his impersonation of Bob Newhart, the American comedian. His deadpan and satirical delivery took him from studying accountancy in Chicago to Hollywood sitcoms and films. Joe was very funny re-enacting some



of Bob's well-known stories with much laughter and applause.

Ray Young entertained thirtyfive members in March with facts and figures about Tanzania and a video about the Serengeti and the Masai warriors.



Tanzania's flag consists of a black diagonal stripe representing the people, with the top triangle its green land, and bottom triangle the blue sea (the Indian ocean). The largest city and capital is Dar es Salaam and of course there is Mount Kilimanjaro, a popular tourist attraction. The country's main export is gold worth £130 billion a year, as well as cashew nuts, Brazil nuts, coffee and coconuts. Their biggest import is oil.

Ray then showed us a video of the Serengeti National Park with all its diverse wildlife including butterflies and birds. The Masai warriors wear red clothing and young boys of 14 get circumcised to become warriors and wear black clothing with white painted faces. A very interesting talk.

Friendship Lunchtime Get-Togethers

There have been three lunchtime get-togethers (October, November and February) at the Tunbridge Wells Constitutional Club in the last six months plus a Christmas lunch in December. In October, twenty-eight members and a guest enjoyed a lovely relaxed lunch with members catching up with old friends and chatting to new ones.

Bomber in the Backyard

In October, fifty members welcomed John Griffiths-Colby to the Constitutional Club. John had been doing some in-depth research into the almost undocumented



crash-landing of 'Incendiary Blonde' 42-95158 on 11 July 1944, on the Hoo Peninsula, Kent. His friend Victor Doe (now 86) witnessed the landing as a 6-year-old lad. Vic formed an enduring friendship with the pilot, 1st Lt. (later Colonel) Malcus S. Horton who gave him a tour of the wreck in 1944. Sadly, during the return from their mission to Munich, two of the crew were killed when their aircraft was damaged after being fired upon by a Messerschmitt.

In capturing Vic's memories and together with letters from Horton, John has uncovered a great deal of detail about the crew – much of it direct from their families in the US. John's talk described the events of that day and the lives and times of the crew – with some remarkable connections in around their service – even through to the tragic sinking of HMS Coventry during the Falklands War in 1982. A truly fascinating talk.

Remembrance Sunday

On Sunday 10 November 2024, Oddfellows throughout the District remembered those who had lost their lives in the First World War and subsequent conflicts. A wreath was laid on behalf of the Branch by Andy Mason at the East Grinstead War memorial, and by Naz Mian at the Tunbridge Wells War memorial.

In October, Tony Reason spoke to twenty-six members about his sponsored trek to Everest Base Camp in October 2013 at the age of 71 years old. Tony explained that he had always had a sense of adventure and had travelled with friends to Scandinavia by motorbike and to Rome by car in the 1960's. Even after marriage, he carried on travelling with his wife. Tony met with a friend who was taking part in the trek to Everest and learnt that there was a space available. The next day he visited a lifelong friend Malcolm, in a hospice, who had MND and after talking to him he decided to go on the trek. Sadly Malcolm passed away the next day.

After giving us some facts about Nepal, Tony then showed a 30 minute video he had made of the 62 mile trek including flying on Yeti Airlines to a remote airfield. The group of ten experienced variable weather conditions and temperatures ranging from plus 20°C to minus 10°C on the trek. However, the scenery in the Himalayas was stunning as well as the flora, wildlife and people. Tony spoke for free, asking that we make a donation to MND, which we gladly did. A truly inspirational talk.



In February, John Wood spoke to twentyseven members about his father Major Leonard Berney. Born to Jewish parents in London in 1920, Leonard Berney joined the army immediately after school and was appointed an officer aged 18. Several years later he was one of the first of the Allied troops through the gates of the disease-ridden, overcrowded Bergen-Belsen Concentration Camp where he came face-to-face with its many horrors. He remained there for 14 weeks, helping save as many lives as possible, and becoming the Commander of the Belsen Displaced Persons Camp. After the war, Leonard became a successful businessman.

The talk included a detailed personal account of the liberation of the camp with video testimony by both Leonard and Belsen survivors, as well as many historical and personal photographs. Initially, Leonard never spoke about Belsen but on the 30th

anniversary of the liberation he told John the whole story. On discovering, some years later, the existence of Holocaust denial Leonard was outraged and started to speak publicly about his Belsen experience. A thoroughly interesting and thought provoking talk.

At the end of October, Thirty-two members gathered for their annual tapas lunch at La Farola restaurant. There were some new members this year and all thoroughly enjoyed the food and drink on offer. Nine tapas dishes were consumed including manchego cheese, dry cured ham, garlic mushrooms, chicken skewers, spicy pork, tuna salad, whitebait and meatballs. Baskets of French bread were frequently replenished. A lot of catching up was done and many thanks were given to the lovely staff who looked after us all.

Thirty-six members returned to La Farola in March to savour another delicious traditional three course Sunday lunch with a glass of wine. Everyone was delighted with the warm friendly atmosphere and enjoyed plentiful food.

John Field told twenty-one members the remarkable story of the Chinese magician Chung Ling Soo in October. The first fact was that this Chinese magician was actually born

in New York State as William Ellsworth Robinson to parents of Scottish decent who were active in Vaudeville. Robinson started performing magic shows at the age of 14 but soon started copying the work of other better known magicians and using false names as he wanted to be a Vaudeville star. He was not initially successful and worked for a while in a magic shop making illusions for other magicians. He developed some illusions for himself and, after seeing a genuine Chinese magician, he dressed similarly and pretended to speak very little English, and adopted his new stage name.

He became very popular, especially in Europe, and eventually became one of the highest paid performers on the Vaudeville circuit. His tricks and illusions became more adventurous and dangerous; he had many feuds with other illusionists, and had a complex love life involving a wife that he married when he was 22 but never divorced and many stage assistants as lovers. He died at the Wood Green Empire, London, as a result of a failed bullet catch trick – it was found out after that the revolver had not been properly cleaned and had backfired. He fell to the ground and said 'oh my God, something's happened, lower the curtain', the only time he had spoken English on stage.

John gave many details about the various tricks that Soo performed and the rivals that he upset. It was a fantastic presentation about a fantastic (but now little known) performer.

Our very last meeting at The Woodman was in November due to the sale and redevelopment of the pub. The everpopular Smokin Mojos unplugged were booked, but unfortunately because the bass player was poorly they came without him and the drummer. However, the two that did come, Bob Brook and John Card, regularly play together as a duo under the name Rebel Strings. Tugs have relatively small fuel tanks and Brian had planned a staged route with several refuelling stops. But the RN man overruled this, had longer stages, and then went on to overfill the boat's fuel supply. Sailing from Rosyth into bad weather in the North Sea, the tug lay too low, took on water, and began to list badly. Brian ordered a diversion into Southampton Water to shield them from the storm and to rectify the problems, but the RN captain bypassed that, resulting in the tug sinking, one man dying, and the remainder of the crew needing to be rescued by helicopter from the sea. So the journey to the Falklands only got just past Southampton. A sad but very informative talk indeed.

Known these days mainly for her fashion and perfume offerings, we heard that Gabrielle Chanel was born in poverty in a charity hospital in 1883, and the family with six children lived in one room. After her mother died, her father left the female children in the grounds of an orphanage where she stayed until the age of 18.

Subsequently she started dancing in clubs (where she picked up the name Coco), met increasingly rich lovers, started designing and making clothes, opened her first boutique, and progressed quite rapidly to a chain of stores. By 1935 she employed over 4,000 staff and sold some 28,000 dresses that year. Although she never married, she was close friends with many well-known men including Dali, Picasso, Russian Grand Duke Dmitri Pavlovich (who killed Rasputin), Ivor Stravinski, the Duke of Westminster, Churchill, and the future King Edward VIII. Also Walter Schellenberg, German Chief of Intelligence and a spy – Coco herself was suspected of being a spy, but was saved from trial by Churchill. She lived the last 30 years of her life in the Paris Ritz hotel.

For all of these, and more, Delia gave us some delightful details of a fantastic life; and what a wonderful presentation by Delia.

When we last saw the East Kent Chorus they came with 11 a cappella singers, but in March they beat even that as 12 of them arrived! And they were all so cheerful, amusing, and obviously enjoying themselves singing, for a donation to their choir funds. The nineteen members present very much enjoyed them too. In February, Geoff Collins spoke to forty-members and guests about Amy Johnson – Woman in a Man's World. Amy was the eldest of four sisters and grew up in Hull

where her father ran a fish export and import business. She studied at Sheffield University before a failed love affair persuaded her to try a new life in London. She worked as a typist for a firm of solicitors and was introduced to flying as a hobby and gained her aviator's certificate and pilot's licence as well as becoming

the first British woman to obtain a ground engineer's licence.

In 1930, Amy achieved worldwide recognition when she became the first woman to fly solo from England to Australia. Geoff spoke about the issues that Amy encountered on that flight and her tour of Australia afterwards and also subsequent record breaking flights. During the Second World War, Amy joined the Air Transport Auxiliary (ATA). On 5 January 1941 while flying an Airspeed Oxford for the ATA from Prestwick to RAF Kidlington near Oxford, it is suggested that Johnson ran out of fuel in adverse weather conditions. Her body has never been recovered. A thoroughly insightful look into the life of Amy Johnson.

With tax season coming to a close, scammers start to move their attention to new opportunities.

As new financial scams emerge, people get targeted in different ways. Our financial services brand, Unity Mutual, has assessed what to watch out for in the coming months.

April to May: The tax refund scam

If an offer seems too good to be true, verify it with official sources before taking action.

Stay vigilant year-round

While some scams are season-specific, fraudsters are always on the lookout for their next victim.



Stay informed, be sceptical of unsolicited requests for money or personal information, and always verify who you're dealing with before taking action.
